Subject: Approval of Updated Street Naming Inventory

Origin: Development Services, Planning Branch

RECOMMENDATIONS

 THAT Development Services, Planning Branch Report P2020-32, dated December 1, 2020, entitled "Approval of Updated Street Naming Inventory" be received; and

2. THAT Council approve the updated Street Naming Inventory, included as Appendix 1 to this report.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to approve the attached updated Street Naming Inventory to ensure the inventory is consistent with the Town's new Street Naming Policy which was approved by Council in October 2020.

BACKGROUND

In accordance with the Town's current Street Naming Policy, Development Services, Planning Branch is responsible for facilitating the naming of municipal streets as well as managing the Town's Approved Street Name Inventory.

The current approved Street Name Inventory contains approximately 231 potential street names, many of which do not meet the current Street Naming Policy.

In March of 2020, a Council workshop was held to discuss the current Street Naming Policy and to receive input from Council on how to proceed with updating the Approved Street Name Inventory. As a result of the Council Workshop, Council directed staff to work on updating the Town's policy prior to updating the approved inventory. Additional recommendations from Council included holding one-on-one meetings with each Councillor to obtain feedback, as well as presenting the Inventory and Policy to the Town's Heritage Advisory Committee and Diversity and Inclusivity Advisory Committee. This work has been carried out from March to October 2020.

In October 2020, Council approved a new Street Naming Policy. The new policy outlines how the approved Street Name Inventory is to be managed by Staff, sets out five categories which nominated street names shall align and sets out clear criteria which all street name nominations must meet.

ANALYSIS

Street Naming Inventory

The current Street Name Inventory includes 231 names which have been approved by Council at various times under the previous Street Naming Policy. Many of the names were nominated by Staff, former members of Council and members of the public.

Through a review of the existing Street Name Inventory in consideration of the updated Street Naming Policy, Staff are recommending that 179 of the 231 approved names be removed from the approved inventory. Of the 179 names recommended for removal, most were for one or more of the following reasons:

- Names with a general/broad meaning that does not clearly fit within the approved street naming categories or do not have clear significance to the Town of East Gwillimbury
- Names that do not meet the criteria set out in Section 8.0 of the Street Naming Policy
- Names that were suggested by Council members for removal in the street naming workshop or one on one meetings with staff
- Names of individuals who we have little or no information on and/or it is unclear whether the individual is still living
- Names that are duplicates or similar to names already assigned in East Gwillimbury

Consultation with Advisory Committees and the Public

In March 2020, an advertisement was placed in the *EG Express* to notify the public of the ongoing update to the Town's Street Naming Policy and Inventory. Some comments were received from the public with respect to individual names on the current approved street name inventory.

Staff also met with the Heritage Advisory Committee and Diversity and Inclusion Committee to discuss the update to the street naming policy and inventory. The Heritage Advisory Committee (HAC) had no comments with respect to the inventory update. The Diversity and Inclusion Committee provided a number of recommendations with respect to the street naming criteria including criteria to ensure that names are easily pronounced and to ensure that discriminatory or derogatory names will not be considered for approval many of those suggestions were included in the updated policy and have been considered in the updated inventory.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no financial implications associated with this report.

NEED FOR PUBLIC CONSULTATION

Information regarding the Street Naming Policy update was posted in the Town Page of the *EG Express* on March 19, 2020 including a link to the recording of the Council Workshop. Some feedback was received from residents with respect to individual names on the Approved Street Name Inventory which were taken into consideration. No further public consultation is required.

Moving forward, Staff will be updating the Town's website to include the updated Street Naming Policy and nomination form so that the public may continue to nominate names for assignment to Municipal Streets.
